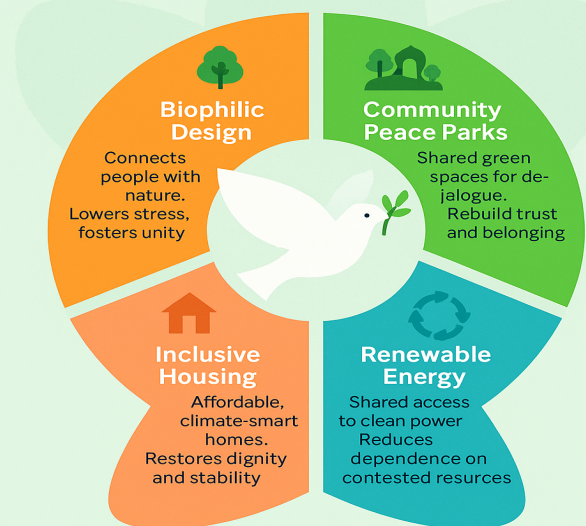
Peaceful communities are not built by chance — they are built by design. Innovative approaches in sustainable architecture and urban planning show how green practices can also become peace practices.

Overview:

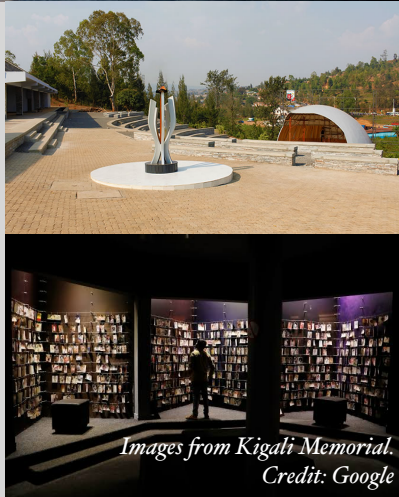

The Kigali Genocide Memorial, Rwanda



After the 1994 genocide, Rwanda faced the immense task of rebuilding not just its cities, but the very fabric of its society. The Kigali Genocide Memorial was designed as both a resting place for over 250,000 victims and a centre for education, reflection, and peace-building. Its tranquil gardens, quiet pathways, and integration of nature create a setting that encourages remembrance while nurturing reconciliation.

This is architecture as therapy — offering a space for collective mourning, but also for cultivating unity and resilience.
